REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS

The minimum leadership requirements for any Cub Scout unit attending long-term camp is a ratio of two adults to a maximum of eight youth and one additional adult for each four additional youth. We strongly recommend Cub Scouts camp with their parent/legal guardian.

Each Cub Scout below the Wolf rank must have a parent/guardian register to attend the full event with them.

ONLINE REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

All resident camp registrations and payments will be made using our online registration system. *Full directions with screen shots can be found at www.users.tentaroo.com.*

When registering be sure that:

1. The rank is correct.
2. You have added both **YOUTH** and **ADULT** names to fill the number of slots you have reserved.
3. You have pre-purchased any shirts or other available products.
4. You **PAY IN FULL** before arrival at resident camp.

REFUNDS

Participants may request a full refund without penalty until May 30, 2026. After this date, registration fees will only be refunded in case of documented illness, injury, emergency, military transfer, or unplanned summer school in accordance with the Natural State Council refund policy. 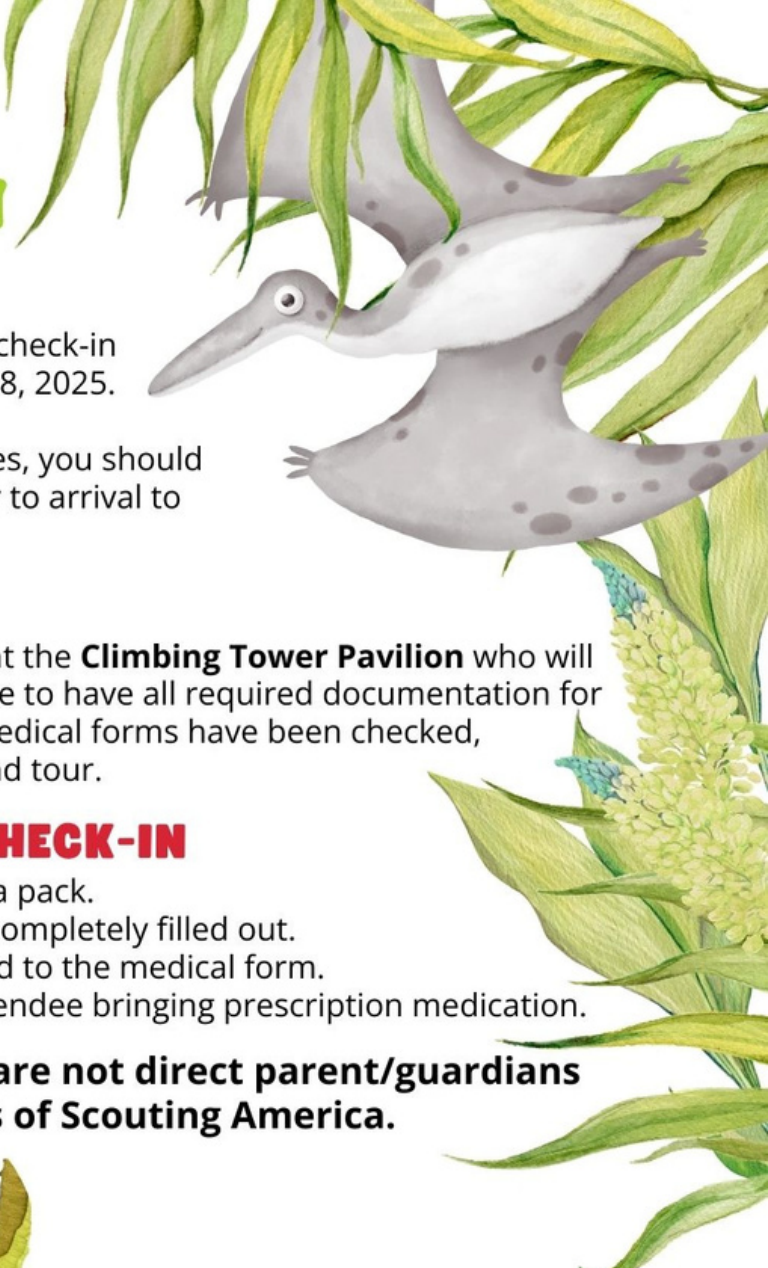
A patch and shirt will be issued to each participant during check-in. Additional products are available for sale on the Natural State Council website and will be available in the trading post at Camp Rockefeller.

ARRIVAL & CHECK-IN



ARRIVAL TIME

Participants should plan to arrive at camp and check-in between 1:00 and 3:00 PM on Wednesday, July 8, 2025.

If your group cannot check-in during these times, you should contact the Camp Director at least a week prior to arrival to make arrangements.

CHECK-IN

Once you arrive you will be met by camp staff at the **Climbing Tower Pavilion** who will guide you through the check-in process. Be sure to have all required documentation for check-in (listed below). Once paperwork and medical forms have been checked, participants will be given a camp orientation and tour.

DOCUMENTS REQUIRED FOR CHECK-IN

1. A unit roster of participants if attending as a pack.
2. The **Annual Health and Medical Record**, completely filled out.
3. A copy of the family insurance card attached to the medical form.
4. Medication dosing instructions for each attendee bringing prescription medication.

NOTE: All Cub Scouts and adults who are not direct parent/guardians of youth must be registered members of Scouting America.

MEDICAL PROCEDURES



ANNUAL HEALTH AND MEDICAL RECORD

WE CANNOT MAKE EXCEPTIONS to health form requirements. Annual Health and Medical Records must be completed and dated within the last 12 months and are required for all campers and leaders participating in resident camp. Here is some important information to remember about Annual Health and Medical Records:

- Parts A and B are required for all campers on property.
- It is the responsibility of each parent to ensure that their Cub Scout has the correct medical forms.
- There is no file of health forms at any camp or council office from previous activities. New forms must be completed and brought to camp with each participant.
- The **Annual Health and Medical Record** is located under the resources section of the resident camp registration page. Only this form will be accepted at check-in.
- All information must be filled out completely, including immunization records and emergency contact information.
- Do not mail, email, or bring health forms to the council office prior to the start of camp. All health forms must be brought to camp with participants.
- If you do not have the correct complete health forms you will not be permitted to check in until the errors are corrected.

HEALTH LODGE

The health lodge is staffed 24 hours a day by a qualified Health Officer who will handle all minor injuries. Any person requiring care outside the scope of the health lodge will be referred to urgent care or to the emergency room of the local hospital.

All accidents and illnesses will be reported to and recorded by the health lodge for the health and safety of camp and for insurance purposes. Camp leadership staff will ensure that proper medical attention and/or transportation is provided to all participants.

HOSPITAL OR DOCTOR PROCEDURES

Any participants who require the attention of a doctor or hospital services will be transported to the nearest appropriate medical provider. It is the responsibility of participant leadership to provide transportation unless the health officer determines that emergency transport is necessary.

One adult leader from the participant group and at least one other adult must accompany the person being transported, and they must obtain the health and medical records necessary from the health lodge before departing to the medical provider. Parents and/or guardians will be notified by the Camp Director immediately of any serious illness or injury.

PRESCRIPTION MEDICATIONS

Participants at resident camp are responsible for administering their own prescription medications. Any medications that require additional needs should be discussed with the Health Officer.

ACCIDENT AND SICKNESS INSURANCE

Each participant should have a copy of their health insurance card attached to their health form. The Scouting America - Council Accident and Sickness Insurance Plan provides secondary coverage for registered Scouts. Natural State Council provides insurance for all participants registered in the council.

HEALTH AND SANITATION

Communal settings such as campgrounds can sometimes be places where illnesses and other diseases can spread easily if proper health and sanitation procedures aren't followed. While at camp, we highly encourage participants to:

- Wash hands regularly, especially before eating
- Not share towels
- Cover mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing
- Visit the health lodge at the first sign of illness

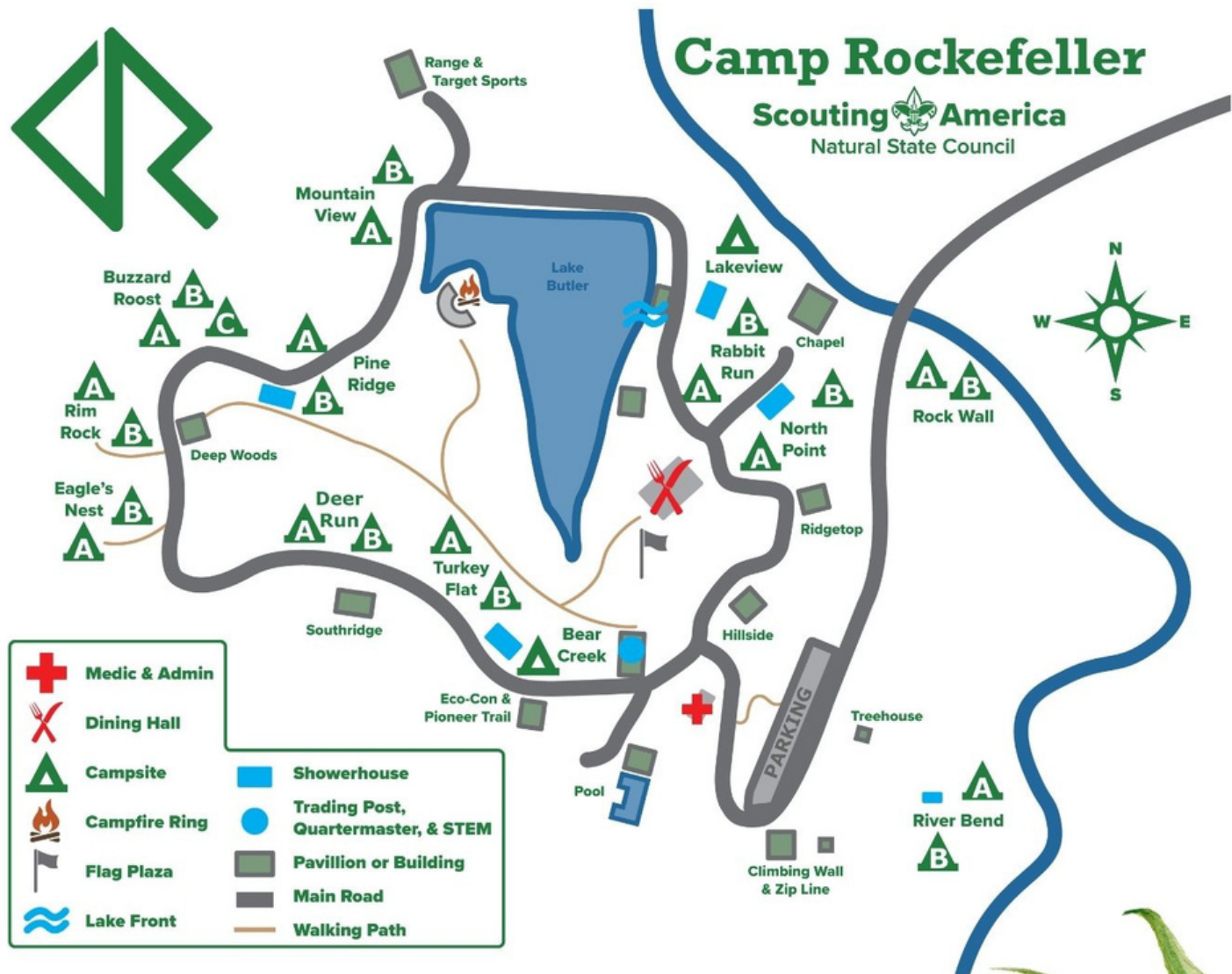
PHOTO RELEASE

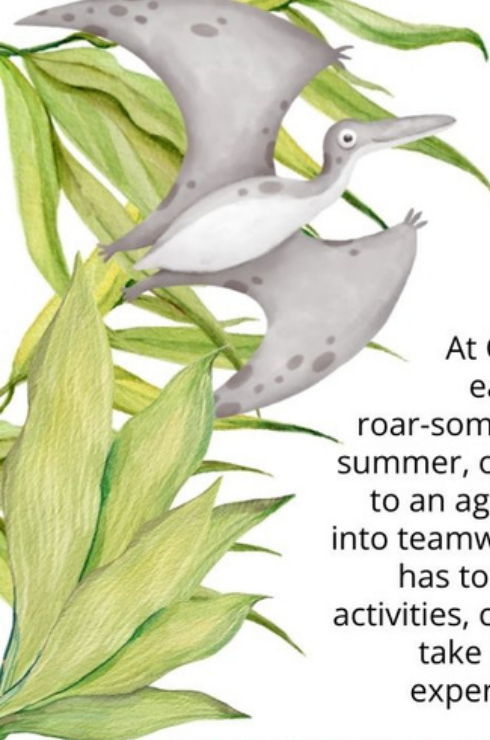




DRIVING AND PARKING POLICIES

Speed limit signs of **10 MPH** are posted around camp. Only camp staff are allowed to drive on camp property past the gate. Participants will park in the gravel parking area and will have camping gear brought to campsites. Once participants are ready to check out they can have their gear brought to their vehicle by camp staff at the end of the event.

At Camp Rockefeller, we believe that resident camp is more than just earning adventure loops; it's about discovering new worlds, making roar-some memories, and diving into an adventure you'll never forget! CAMPsites AND RESTROOM FACILITIES

Each campsite is equipped with tents that are built on concrete platforms that help keep unwanted visitors out. To protect against rain a large tarp is stretched over the top of each tent. There are two cots per tent, which allows space for participants to unpack their belongings. Each campsite is close to restroom facilities with locking doors, flushing toilets, potable water, with multiple shower-houses positioned around camp with hot water.

ACCESSIBLE CAMPING

Camp Rockefeller provides a barrier-free campsite that features wheelchair-accessible tent platforms, paved walkways, and electrical service for all tents. THE POOL

Our camp features an Olympic-sized swimming pool where participants can kick back and enjoy the cool water during the hot summer day. The pool is not just a place for relaxation, Cub Scouts can also earn their swimming focused adventure loops here during camp.

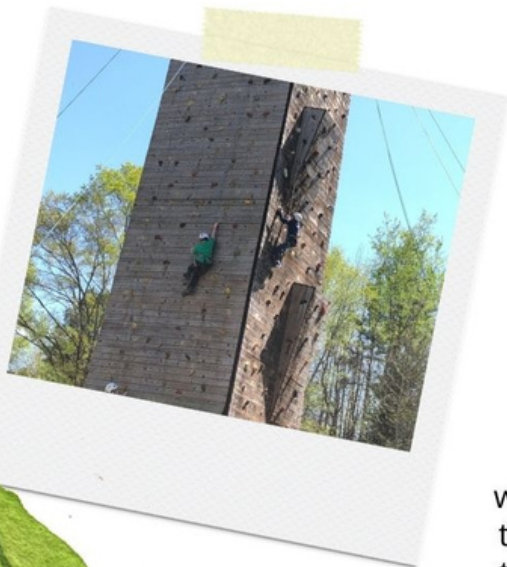


STEM COMPLEX

CAMP POLICIES

GENERAL RULES

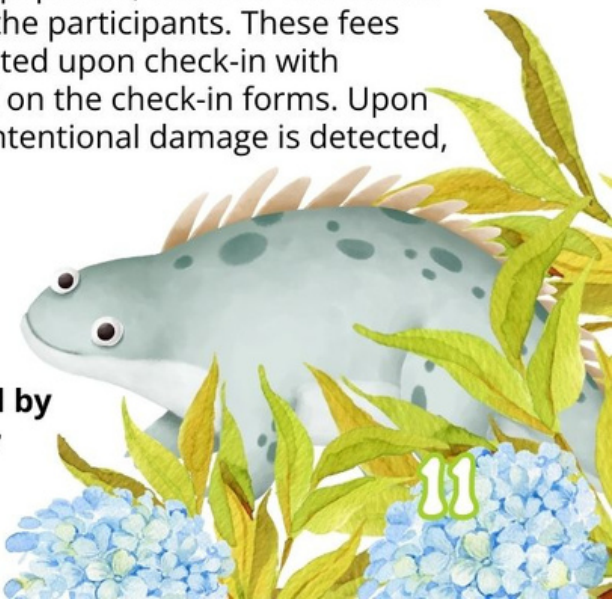
These rules are for the safety of all campers and staff:

- Participants must have two-deep leadership at all times while at camp.
- Open-toed shoes are not allowed unless at the pool/shower areas.
- No fireworks of any kind are permitted on camp property.
- No flames, fires, or fuels of any kind are permitted inside tents.
- Throwing rocks is strictly forbidden.
- Personal firearms and bows are not permitted and should be left at home.
- All vehicles must be parked in the designated camp parking areas. Only authorized vehicles are allowed in campsites or on the roads.
- No alcoholic beverages or illegal substances are allowed on camp property.
- Smoking by adults is only allowed in the main parking lot out of sight from youth campers.
- Sheath knives: camp policy prohibits the possession of sheath knives.
- No lasers of any kind are permitted in camp.
- All ATVs are prohibited from use by Scouts and adult leaders.
- Posted speed limit of 10 MPH must be obeyed in camp.
- RVs are not allowed.
- Pets are not allowed in camp.
- Only those persons authorized by the Natural State Council Camp Director or Camp Ranger may operate power tools or equipment on the Gus Blass Scout Reservation.
- All personnel, including campers, leaders, staff, and guests arriving at camp or leaving camp must check in and out at the camp administration building.
- Youth Protection Guidelines will be strictly followed at all times and any violation of these guidelines will be reported immediately. Everyone's vigilance is necessary to provide a safe camp for everyone.
- All registered adult leaders must present a current Youth Protection Certificate upon arrival.
- Refer to the Scouting America Guide to Safe Scouting for additional policies.

DAMAGES TO EQUIPMENT

Normal usage and wear will result in some breakage of equipment; however the cost of damage or breakage due to horseplay will be charged to the participants. These fees must be paid before leading. Each campsite will be inspected upon check-in with participants. All imperfections to equipment will be noted on the check-in forms. Upon check out, the same sheets will be used for check out. If intentional damage is detected, the participants will be charged the following:

Cot Replacement	\$50
Rips and Tears to Tents	\$30 per tent
Damage to Platform and Frame	Up to \$150
Tent Replacement	\$750
Other Damages	Amount determined by Ranger and Director



SAFEGUARDING YOUTH



SCOUTING'S BARRIERS TO ABUSE

Scouting America has adopted the following policies for the safety and wellbeing of its members. These policies primarily protect youth members; however, they also serve to protect adult leaders. All parents and caregivers should understand that our leaders are to abide by these safeguards. Parents and youth are strongly encouraged to use these safeguards outside the Scouting program. Registered leaders must follow these guidelines with all Scouting youth outside of Scouting activities.

REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS

The chartered organization representative, or in their absence the executive officer of the chartered organization, must approve the registration of the unit's adult leaders. Registration includes:

- Completion of application including criminal background check and mandatory Youth Protection training
- Volunteer Screening Database check

Current Youth Protection training is required for leaders when renewing their registration or at unit charter renewal. Adult program participants who are not direct parent/guardians must register as adults and follow Youth Protection policies.

ADULT SUPERVISION

Two registered adult leaders 21 years of age or over are required at all Scouting activities, including meetings. There must be a registered female adult leader over 21 in every unit serving females. A registered female adult leader over 21 must be present for any activity involving female youth. Age and program-appropriate supervision must always be provided.

One-on-one contact between adult leaders and youth members is prohibited inside and outside of Scouting.

- In situations requiring a personal conference, the meeting is to be conducted with the knowledge and in view of other adults and/or youth.
- Private online communications (texting, phone calls, chat, IM, etc.) must include another registered leader or parent.

Discipline must be constructive.

- Discipline must reflect Scouting's values.
- Corporal punishment is never permitted.
- Disciplinary activities involving isolation, humiliation, or ridicule are also prohibited.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Separate accommodations for adult males and females and youth males and females are provided. This includes tenting, dressing/changing, and showering facilities.
